"When I became sick the artworks just started flowing out of me and my aunty decided to take me along to Gangga Marrang to show them my work." Gangga Marrang is Taree's newest art experience and will open its doors next Friday.

Amanda Bicknell said they were more than happy to include Leisa in their opening exhibit and expect to see a lot more of her.

"She's obviously very naturally talented," says Amanda.
