Tips for our students

Whilst completing HSC (e.g. how to gain the desired UAI)

• Enjoy your time at school because it flies by so quickly. Don't stress out. The pressure of exams can be tough but you will make it through. Use your teachers. They are there to help you receive the results your desire. Re-read and re-read your work until its second nature. Writing and practicing proforma essays is also extremely valuable and takes a lot of the stress out of exams. Remember failing to prepare is preparing to fail (a corny quote but very true). Also, although your HSC is important do try to find some time to relax, and remember if you don't get your desired result, life goes on and it's not the end of the world. I've see a lot of people nearly crack under the pressure so don't let that happen to you. Be confident in your abilities to get where you want in life. Where there is a will there is a way.

Going to University (e.g. living away from home tips, university life)

• Do your research when looking for accommodation. On campus accommodation might not be the right choice for you. There is also off campus housing and rooming with friends. All are good options but have different costs so pick something that's right for you. Uni is a lot more laid back then high school and you are trusted to pick your own class times and decide if you turn up on time etc. So pick the classes that are right for you, and organise your schedule well. Don't pick classes that conflict in times etc.

Also get in quick when picking your classes because the best times

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fill up fast! Also, no one is really watching over your shoulder to make sure you do your assignments on time so make sure your organised or you might get stuck doing some last minute cramming (not that we haven't all been there once in a while)



Getting a job (during and after university)

• A good Resume is key. Make sure it is set out neatly and to the point and the less clutter the better. Your possible employer might have only a few minutes to read it so make sure your get their attention fast. In job interviews be on time (or even a little early), be presentable and be friendly. First impressions last.

Other Tips

• Be confident. If you're confident in yourself and your abilities others will feed off that and be confident in you too. And most importantly, follow your dreams! I can't say this enough.
