Delayed Release of NAPLAN 2013 Students Reports to Parents

On Thursday 5 September ACARA identified an error in the placement of the national average markers on the Years 5 and 7 NAPLAN Student Reports for Language Conventions. Importantly the NAPLAN student data is correct.

ACARA made the immediate decision to halt any further packaging and distribution of NAPLAN reports while options regarding the distribution of correct NAPLAN Student Reports were considered.

ACARA is working closely with Test Administration Authorities (TAAs) in every state and territory to ensure correct reports are distributed.

This matter may result in the delay of the distribution of student reports, possibly to the week of 13 October, however ACARA and TAAs will seek to minimise the delay."

Focus on Reading

Literacy teaching and learning

All staff members at Chatham High School have been introduced to an exciting, whole-school approach to literacy teaching and learning called *Focus on Learning*. Focus on Reading 3-6 is an intensive professional learning program for teachers to support the explicit teaching of the key aspects of reading in the middle years, namely comprehension, vocabulary and reading text fluency.

The program draws from a sound research base that justifies the need for these key aspects to be at the forefront of literacy teaching and learning in the middle years and to motivate learners in the middle years. Workshops are being led by Focus on Reading trainers Mrs Tracey Beckett, Head Teacher English and Ms Judi Wood, Literacy Support Teacher. In addition, fourteen teachers from all faculties will continue their training and certification in Focus on Reading under the guidance of Mrs Beckett and Ms Wood.

To date, teachers have looked closely at the Super 6 Comprehension Strategies and have begun to implement these strategies into all Year 7 classes. The strategies are Making Connections, Predicting, Questioning, Monitoring, Visualising and Summarising and apply to readers of all levels, from young children to adults.



Also, we have been using the DEC Literacy Continuum 7-10, which is a tool that can inform us of the expected learning at given points in time, to develop a Comprehension learning sequence and move students through the sequence. Comprehension involves responding to, interpreting, analysing and evaluating texts. 'Texts' include oral, aural, written, visual, electronic and multimodal texts.

Focus on Reading training is expected to continue into 2014 and is only one of the range of programs offered at Chatham High School to support all students to achieve their best in literacy and all subjects.

TAS Update

It's been another busy term for the TAS faculty and Stage 6 students.

Year 12 Industrial Technology and Textile students have been spending extra hours of their time to complete HSC Major projects. Year 11 have been going out on VET Work Placements and the Hospitality students have been cooking up a storm.

On Tuesday 23 July, Year 12 Exploring Early Childhood students, along with their teacher Mrs Eadndel, visited Chatham Primary School to observe students in Kindergarten classes. These Year 12 students were completing a task for their study unit on 'Starting School'. Our students also interviewed Ms Amanda Pitt, who teaches Kindergarten. This gave them a helpful insight into the educational and social issues that relate to young students in the early stages of their schooling. Many of these students are contemplating continuing their studies in educating children in early childhood. The morning visit was a fantastic opportunity to observe children in their schooling environment first hand.

On the 26 July, Year 11 and 12 Hospitality produced a wonderful array of food for the Taree Career Expo. Our students and Hospitality staff, Mrs Kouwenhoven, Mr James, Aunty Rhonda and Naomi worked for the whole day to provide high quality canapés for the exhibitors. Taree High School will be running the Hospitality facet for next year's Expo and using our kitchen facilities.

During Weeks 4-7 this term, Year 11 VET students ventured out to local businesses around Taree for Hospitality, Information Technology and Construction. This Work Placement scheme provides students with the necessary experience to work in the industry of their VET courses.

The Year 12 Textiles and Design students' Major Works were due for submission on Monday 12 August and were sent to Sydney to the Board of Studies for marking. This is worth 50% of their HSC marks. The students were required to find inspiration, then design and produce a piece of work based upon their inspiration. They also had to document all steps of their process in a folio which was also submitted. The Chatham High School students mainly chose to work in the areas of Costume and Apparel, although they were also able to choose from Furnishings, Textile Arts or Non Apparel. All students worked exceptionally hard to complete this task many staying back after school for a number of weeks. Mrs Roberts is very proud of these students and their efforts.

The TAS Faculty would also like to wish Miss Tolentino a fond farewell. Starting Term 4, Miss Tolentino will be heading back to Sydney for a Technology teaching position at East Hills Girls High School. The students and TAS faculty will miss her and her technology skills. We wish her luck at her new school.

Maths Mate

This year, as part of the Chatham High School Numeracy program, all Year 7 and 8 students were given a Maths Mate worksheet on a regular basis. There are eight worksheets to be completed each term, generally one per week, the exceptions being short or disrupted weeks.

The Maths Mate worksheets have been designed to allow students to attempt all questions without the aid of a calculator, and this should be encouraged at home.

Don't be too concerned if your child finds the initial worksheet difficult. It is not expected that students will be able to complete every question from week one; in fact Q33 has been included to offer a real challenge to all students. Each worksheet is built around a common framework of questions aimed at covering the Australian Mathematics Curriculum.

While there is room on the worksheet for the recording of answers, this is only intended as a summary of the student's work. An asterisk '*' has been used to indicate those



questions where each student has been asked to show his or her working. In these cases the detail normally expected in Mathematics should be included, with all steps in the development of answers clearly shown. This working should be attached to the worksheet and submitted with it.

Corresponding questions on each worksheet cover the same skill area, that is, Q1 always tests adding whole numbers to 10, Q22, subtracting whole numbers to 10, and so on, with the questions within each category becoming progressively more difficult from week to week.

Students will be confronted by the same type of question on a regular basis. The diagnostic nature of the worksheets will help students and teachers to identify areas of strength and weakness. This should also help to motivate students to make another attempt at mastering skills that they may have found too difficult in the past. As well, the results sheet, if completed accurately, will allow students to enjoy monitoring their own improvement.

If your child is having difficulty with a certain skill, Skill Builders are available to students, teachers and parents from the Maths Mate website **www.mathsmate.net** The Skill Builders also contain a Glossary of important facts and reference material that will provide students with instant help.

We thank you in anticipation of your involvement and remind you that you are encouraged to call and discuss your child's progress at any time.

Ag Update

Year 9 Agriculture students have been nurturing 24 hens' eggs over the last three weeks.

This is involved setting the eggs in an incubator set at 37.5°C which is the ideal temperature for developing chicks. Water was added to keep the humidity level up which prevents the eggs from dehydrating.

Eggs were weighed daily to monitor the weight loss of the eggs. Research showed that the eggs should lose weight as the chicks grow. The eggs did lose weight but nowhere near as much as the research indicated. At day 20 we were fearful that our eggs were not developing. Then we noticed that one egg moved by itself. Hope was restored! Mr Gay took the eggs home over the weekend but brought them back on Monday still unhatched. During the morning one egg began to show signs of hatching but it didn't come out of the shell until 4pm. A second egg hatched at 6pm and another three hatched overnight.

On Tuesday morning another two eggs were cracked and others were moving independently. At 1pm the sixth egg had hatched. As this report is going to press, we are awaiting the fate of the remaining eggs.

An unusual fact about one of the chicks is that it only has feathers on its head, wings and legs, showing no signs of feathers on its head at all. If anyone reading this knows why, Mr Gay would love to hear from you.

Reluctantly, students and teachers returned to the coach, happy and satisfied.


3pm: Everyone aboard the coach, escaping peak hour traffic.
