Some important messages and reminders for students and families

School attendance: Lateness to school, whole day attendance and attendance at sport

All students are required to attend school by 9.00 am each day, including senior students who have a study period in period one. I am concerned by the number of students who are arriving at school after 9.00 am without a note from a parent or carer explaining the reason for lateness. All parents and carers are requested to assist by ensuring students arrive at school on time or have a note to explain lateness. All late students will need to come through the front office to have the time of their arrival recorded. This is a legal requirement the school must meet.

I am also concerned about the number of students who are missing whole days from school, particularly those who do so without reason. This is disrupting their learning and it can be difficult to catch up missed work. All absences must be explained and the reason recorded by the school. I thank the parents who provide notes to explain illness or who request leave from school for their child. I hope to see an improvement in school attendance with your assistance.

Attendance at sport is compulsory for students in Years 7-10. Sport is a compulsory part of the curriculum, the same as English, maths or science. A student may only be exempted from sport on the basis of illness, with a note explaining the reason. It is my expectation that all students attend sport and participate in the programs that have been organised by the sports organisers, Mr Wilson and Mr Bourke. Students will not be allowed to leave school at lunch on sport days without written permission from their parents that clearly states the reason for absence from school.

Mobile phones

Phones are to be switched off and out of sight while at school.

They can be a distraction to learning and it is important for students to interact with each other face-to-face during lunch and recess. I am concerned that recently some students have misused their phones and some parents feel the need to contact their son or daughter via their mobile whilst students are in class.

If the situation is an emergency please ring the school and we will get the message to the child or bring them to the front



office to talk to you. If your child is sick we will look after them in sick bay and ring you.

There are consequences in place for failing to follow the school policy re mobile phones.

First time is a verbal warning, phone confiscated for the day and register on our database, the second time is phone confiscated for the day and the phone is passed to a Deputy Principal, and a parent contacted.

Uniform

Congratulations to all the students who wear full school uniform to school each day. On most days, the students look terrific and show their pride in Chatham High School.

A small number of students, however, need to make better choices about what they wear to school, in particular when they say to their parents and carers that "others don't wear uniform" as an excuse to not wear correct uniform themselves. I am not accepting this as an excuse. It is the responsibility of every Chatham student to wear the correct uniform, and not blame other students for their poor choices about what they wish to wear to school. Uniform assistance is available from the school, and parents are able to access student assistance for uniform items. Please contact Ms Groth, HT Welfare at the school for further information

This is an exciting part of our school that allows staff and students to explore, in depth, what it means to be a 21st century learner. Maths Mate.

As part of the Chatham High School Numeracy program all Year 8 and 9 students will be given a Maths Mate worksheet on Wednesday of each week.

Designed for use up to Year 10, this program is centred around the completion of weekly worksheets, allowing students to systematically revise all the skills related to their respective levels of the key mathematical strands. With emphasis placed on revision and the gradual development of mathematical competency, Maths Mate allows students to keep their numeracy skills up to date and consolidate their knowledge, skills and problem solving abilities. It is also an extremely useful diagnostic tool enabling teachers and students to identify areas of strength and areas that require improvement. Feedback from both staff and students has been overwhelmingly positive and we encourage the support of parents/carers in the implementation of the program.

What is NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. All students in these year levels are expected to participate in tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

NAPLAN is the measure through which governments, education authorities, schools, teachers and parents can determine whether or not young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy. The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. They also provide schools, states and territories with information about how education programs are working and which areas need to be prioritised for improvement.

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of the school's assessment and reporting process, and do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance.

What will be tested and how?

NAPLAN tests the sorts of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life, such as reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy. The content of each test is informed by the national *Statements of Learning* for English and mathematics, which underpin state and territory learning frameworks. Questions are multiple-choice or require a short written response. The writing task requires students to write a text in response to a prompt.

Who will run the tests?

NAPLAN tests are conducted at schools and administered by classroom teachers, school deputies or the principal. Each state and territory is responsible for marking the tests in accordance with strict guidelines and processes.

How can I help my child prepare for the tests?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are already learning through the school curriculum. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the test formats and will provide appropriate support and guidance. If you have any questions about your child's preparation for NAPLAN, you should make a time to speak with their teacher.

The best way you can help your child prepare for NAPLAN is to reassure your child that NAPLAN tests are just one part of their school program, and to urge them to simply do the best they can on the day. The use of services by coaching providers is not recommended.

What additional support can schools provide for students with special needs?

All students are encouraged to participate in NAPLAN tests. Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided in the classroom. Students who have a temporary injury may also be reasonably accommodated. A formal exemption may be granted for a student with significant intellectual disability and/or significant co-existing conditions, or who has recently arrived in Australia and is from a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your state testing authority can provide you with more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.



How is NAPLAN performance measured?

NAPLAN is not a pass or fail type test. Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each test. Each test scale has 10 bands and all year levels are reported on the same scale. Six bands are reported for each year level for each test. One of these bands represents the national minimum standard for students at each year level. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level. The performance of individual students can be compared to the average performance of all students in Australia.

What happens if my child is absent from school on test days?

Wherever possible, schools will organise for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during testing week. Individual students are not permitted to sit tests after Friday 16 May 2014.

Will I receive a report on my child's performance?

A NAPLAN report will be issued by your school later in the year. The same report format is used for every student in Australia. The school will notify you when the reports are being sent to you. If you do not receive a report, you should contact the school. Individual student results are strictly confidential.

How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Schools use results to identify strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help them better identify students who require greater challenges or additional support.

National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy 2014

LETTER TO PARENTS

In May 2014 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy skills of students across Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) will be collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The NAPLAN tests will be conducted from 13 - 15 May 2014.

In the Numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. In Years 7 and 9 there will be two Numeracy tests: one where a calculator is allowed and one where calculators are not to be used. For the calculator test, the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.

In 2014, as in previous years, the Writing task will be a single common task for all students. The 2014 Writing test will require students to respond to either a persuasive or narrative Writing prompt. However, the genre of the prompt will not be disclosed prior to the test period.

Wherever possible, schools will organise for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during testing week. Individual students are not permitted to sit tests after Friday 16 May 2014.

Students may be considered for exemption from the tests if:

- they are newly arrived in Australia (less than one year before the test) and with a language background other than English, or
- they have significant intellectual disability and/or significant co-existing conditions which severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests.

All other students are expected to participate in the tests. Disability adjustments which reflect the student's normal level of support in the classroom may be provided. Large print, Braille, coloured paper versions and electronic tests are available to meet the needs of individual students.

Access to disability adjustment or exemption from the tests must be discussed with the school Principal and a parent or carer consent form must be signed. Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents in consultation with the Principal. If you wish to withdraw your child from the tests, a parent or carer consent form must be signed.

Please make an appointment with the Principal of the school your child attends if you would like to discuss your child's participation in NAPLAN.


