



Term 2 brought with it a number of challenges, not the least of which has been the difficulty faced by the school in sourcing staff to cover leave and other absences. However, this has not been a problem faced by Chatham alone. Across the state, particularly in rural and regional areas, schools have been hit hard by a shortage of trained teachers who would ordinarily have sought casual work. As a principal there are few decisions that sting more than the one made to combine un-covered classes and place them in the library to be supervised. The desperate staff situation has been highlighted time and again when we have sought to recruit new staff to roles within the school and have had no replies, again a problem faced by several schools in our area and across the state. The new term promises some relief from these staffing pressures as we will welcome a number of new staff to the school and we will introduce them in a later newsletter.

Term 2 has seen a return to some sense of normality after the trials faced by everyone 12 months ago and students and staff relished a return to some regular whole school events. Our athletics and cross-country carnivals once again gave students an opportunity to test themselves against peers and their own personal best, with a number of students continuing on to represent the school at regional carnivals. Our combined Reconciliation and NAIDOC week was finished off in style this year as we joined with Harrington Public School to celebrate and participate in cultural activities on country at Crowdy Bay. A highlight for me was walking the beach listening to Uncle Jeremy talk about the stories that are connected to that place and to hear about the traditions that live strong through generations of Biripi people.

With the close of term we also have come to the end of Semester 1 and reports on student progress have been handed out to students on Friday. They were also emailed out to parents and posted to the Parent Portal to view and print. If your student was not at school on Friday they will be handed a hardcopy of their reports during week one. As I signed off on the reports, I took note of a number of exceptional efforts being made across the year groups and I must congratulate those students who will no doubt feature prominently in our semester one academic assembly scheduled for Week 3. Invitations will make their way home next term. Please also think about scheduling an appointment to discuss your student's report with their class teacher during our parent/teacher interviews in Week 4.

I hope students enjoy their break, take time to refocus and are ready to return to learning in Term 3. A term which will see us become a phone free learning environment with every student required to place their phone in a pouch to prevent them from becoming a distraction. You do not have to look far to find research that talks about the serious health concerns many researchers have about the use of mobile phones particularly by young people and their negative impact is felt daily at school. Yondr is a company that has developed a system to safely and securely store mobile electronic devices to prevent them from becoming a distraction at concerts, workplaces and places of education. There will be plenty of information to accompany the roll-out and an information evening for parents during week one to learn more about this initiative.

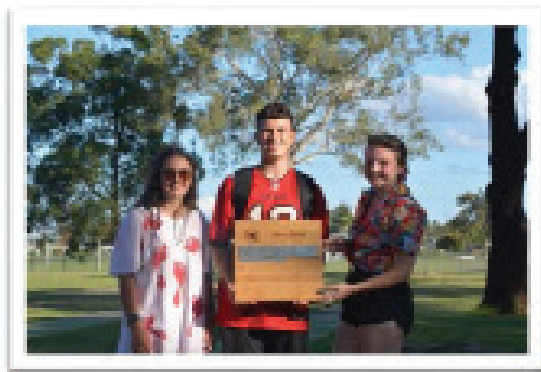
The Long Jump area will also be used for cultural days, as place for Aboriginal dancing sessions, for all students.

The Death Penny

Percy Martin was born in Taree in 1894, he was my great-great-uncle.

His occupation in Taree was as a Law Clerk. He enlisted in Adelaide and was in the 10th Battalion as part of the ANZAC troops who were sent to Gallipoli as part of the BEF (British Expeditionary Force).

Before 1916 British Generals controlled the Australian and New Zealand armed forces.

Percy arrived at ANZAC Cove on the 16th July 1915 and served high on the ridge of Chatham's Post to the south. This position was open to enemy fire from the front and both left and right sides and so was a very exposed position.

He died on the 1st of August 1915 aged just 21, his headstone is one of many at Lone Pine Cemetery, Gallipoli.

The memorial plaque was given to Commonwealth soldiers' families who were killed during WW1.

It features Britannia and a lion on the front with the inscription 'He gave his life for freedom and honour'.

The soldier's full name is engraved on the bottom right of the plaque but no rank, unit, titles or decorations were ever included so as to signify the equality of sacrifice made by all casualties.

Its shape earned it the nickname 'dead man's penny', 'death penny' or 'widows penny'.

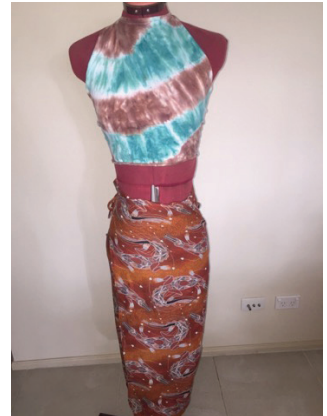
Inspiration for my textile assignment – Madeline Vale

As I love creating my own tie dye designs, I wanted to show my passion and creativity in my halter tops. I wanted to put a modern twist on a traditional outfit. This is why my skirts, which I made in my Textiles class, have been created using aboriginal designed fabrics.

My tops have been designed to be easy wearing whilst capturing natural colours and modern trends.

This semester students in our Technical and Applied Studies classes, supported by their teachers, have been extremely busy completing some high quality, final products and project work.



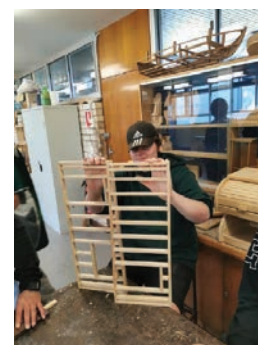

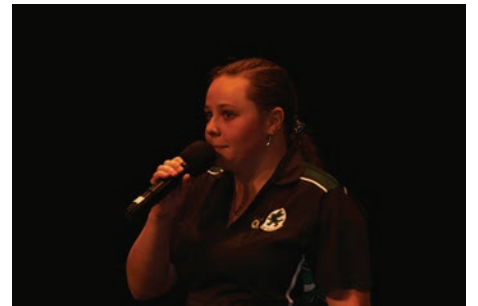
Music

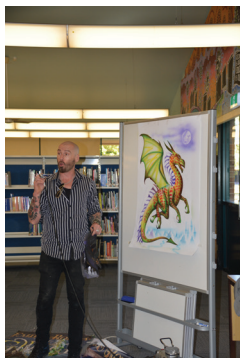

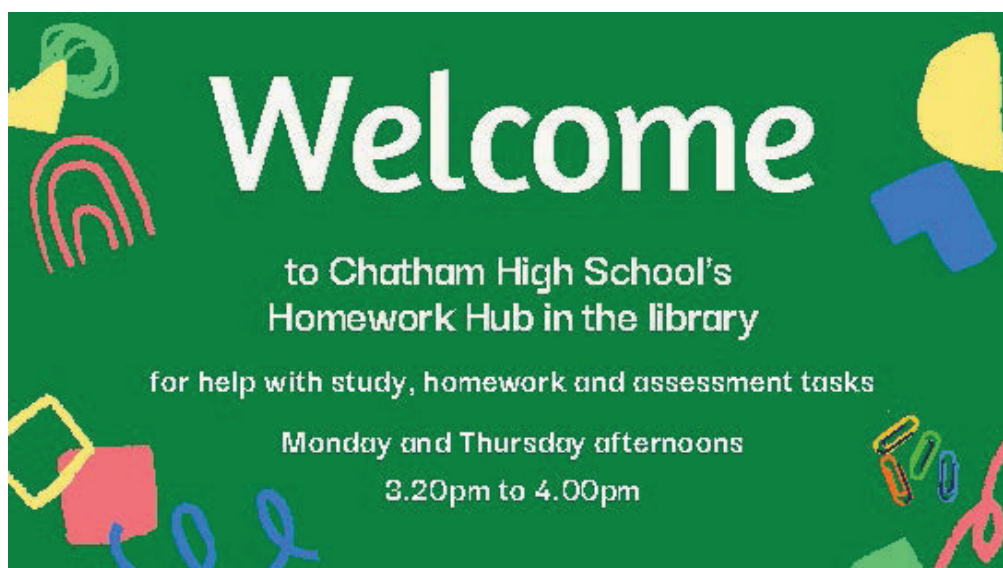
Over the course of the day hundreds of pancakes were poured, flipped, plated, delivered, and eaten. Everyone was treated to a flavoursome and enjoyable

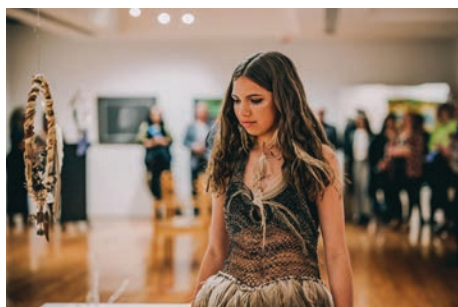
Our Aboriginal Dance groups have seen growth this year with our school now having 4 dance groups.

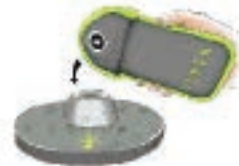
