

# The Way We Work

Since opening in 2016, Chatham Academy has had the privilege of seeing many young men graduate from Year 12 and continue their life successfully beyond the school gates.

The Clontarf Foundation value seeing the young men we work with become the best version of themselves. With Clontarf's continued support post-school, these men are creating multiple success stories around the nation.

With the support and partnership of Rio Tinto, this has certainly been the case with Chatham Academy alumnus Griffin Humphreys.

"After graduating high school, I started attending the University of Newcastle, studying a Bachelor of Information Technology and majoring in Business Technology," Griffin said.

"This, in conjunction with my HSC results, meant I was accepted into the Rio Tinto Cadetship program. This program aims to connect current university students with sponsors for Rio Tinto vacation roles where each participant completes a project. I have since completed three vacation roles.

"My first role was in 2019 in Perth working out of the Operation Centre (OC) with the Iron Ore product family in the Software Development and Production Systems & Networks teams. This role was a short term 12-week placement where I worked on the GPS systems for the automated haul trucks on sites scattered all throughout the west coast.

"It was shortly after this placement that COVID-19 hit Australia, meaning my studies and placement roles were impacted. Fortunately, I was offered a role in the Brisbane OC working with the Bauxite product family in the Integrated Operations & Production Improvement team. This role was heavily reliant on data analytics for a predictive fuel use/management system. My time in Brisbane was far less about being introduced to mining and had a heavier focus on becoming an integrated team member of Rio Tinto, establishing roots through personal connections and networking.

"My third placement once again took place in Brisbane, however this time it was in Enterprise Architecture performing data engineering tasks. This placement was the final confirmation for me and my desire to work with Rio Tinto. Through this position, I was fortunate enough to be working with the America & Eastern Europe global groups of the company. This expansion of my internal support network showed the limitless opportunities available through Rio Tinto.

"Coming this July, I will be graduating from the University of Newcastle and starting my Graduate position as a Data Engineer with Rio Tinto. It's important to note that none of this would have been possible without the help of Clontarf. Without them assisting me in applying for the Rio Tinto Cadetship program, none of the aforementioned events would have followed.

"My advice to any high school student reading this would be that there's no harm in trying and the only thing holding you back is yourself, so don't let the words of others or your doubt stop you from achieving your goals and dreams whatever they may be."

Congratulations, Griffin - this is a fantastic achievement. A big thank you to valued Clontarf partner Rio Tinto, who have changed this young man's life.







